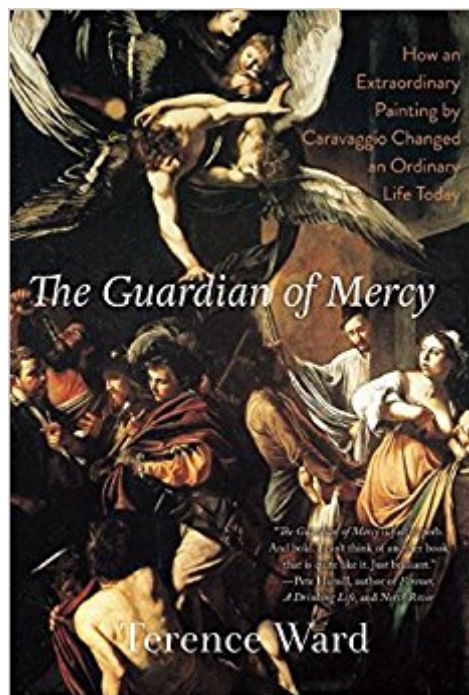




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The Guardian Of Mercy: How An Extraordinary Painting By Caravaggio Changed An Ordinary Life Today



Synopsis

Now celebrated as one of the great painters of the Renaissance, Michelangelo Merisi da Caravaggio fled Rome in 1606 to escape retribution for killing a man in a brawl. Three years later he was in Naples, where he painted *The Seven Acts of Mercy*. A year later he died at the age of thirty-eight under mysterious circumstances. Exploring Caravaggio's singular masterwork, in *The Guardian of Mercy* Terence Ward offers an incredible narrative journey into the heart of his artistry and his metamorphosis from fugitive to visionary. Ward's guide in this journey is a contemporary artist whose own life was transformed by the painting, a simple man named Angelo who shows him where it still hangs in a small church in Naples and whose story helps him see its many layers. As Ward unfolds the structure of the painting, he explains each of the seven mercies and its influence on Caravaggio's troubled existence. Caravaggio encountered the whole range of Naples's vertical social layers, from the lowest ranks of poverty to lofty gilded aristocratic circles, and Ward reveals the old city behind today's metropolis. Fusing elements of history, biography, memoir, travelogue, and journalism, his narrative maps the movement from estrangement to grace, as we witness Caravaggio's bruised life gradually redeemed by art.

Terence Ward was born in Boulder, Colorado, and spent his childhood in Saudi Arabia and Iran. Also the author of *Searching for Hassan* (Anchor 2003), he is a cross-cultural consultant who has advised corporations and governments in the Islamic world and the West.

Follow Terence Ward and his wise, adventurous wife, Idanna, on a time-bending, transcultural odyssey through realms both sacred and profane. Their guide is Angelo Esposito, the title character, who gives us access to the underbelly of contemporary Naples. This jack-of-many-trades recounts his hardscrabble childhood (—• #147;By staying pregnant, my mother stayed out of jail —• #147;), an escape from reform school, and fleeting, menial jobs. Steady work with the city —• #147;s Department of Sanitation opens the path to salvation. The paycheck earned by drudgery in the ancient sewers of Naples provides for a colorful family with whom we grow more and more intimate, along with the cronies whose contempt for official authority is more than justified. When an enlightened mayor decides to revitalize the city —• #147;s cultural heritage, Angelo lands the job of caretaker of the dilapidated Pio Monte Della Misericordia, home to an obscure painting whose history and significance is a matter of indifference to its guardian. Until one fateful day —• #147; Angelo —• #147;s tale unfolds concurrently with a richly imagined portrayal of the painting —• #147;s creator, the mysterious genius known to civilization as —• #147; Caravaggio. —• #147; Ward depicts his arrival in Naples as a spiritually tormented fugitive and dramatizes his encounters with the common people who will personify the verses of St. Matthew he is commissioned to paint by a remarkable group of young, pious aristocrats. —• #147; “You move hearts and bring the Gospels alive,” —• #147; they tell him. Ward —• #147;s sensuous, exuberant prose brings life to an exhilarating spectrum of religious and philosophical concepts. The book features a treasure trove of quotes from sages of many eras and cultures. Whatever your faith or degree of spirituality, you will experience the power of art to bring heaven down to earth.

Randomly choosing this book to read was no accident. Usually a student of the Bible, apologetics, current events, and science, I rarely venture into the realm of storytelling, and even less so artistic expressions. Recently my spirit has been drawn to exploring artistic expression (others and my

own) as a way to slow down and enhance my sensitivity to the real needs of people around me, and to express Truth in other ways besides a convincing argument. This book was perfect timing. The description of the revolutionary painting and the lives touched and transformed by it, when applying the Truth to the subjects, inspires the reader to slow down and look a little closer at the ordinary people and situations needing the presence of Christ. The only thing missing was a good image of the centerpiece painting, looking it up online probably won't be sufficient, the travelogue description makes me want to include southern Italy on my bucket list for travel.

The weaving of the story of Caravaggio with the life of the ordinary man who "guards" the painting of the seven mercies will captivate the reader. Many will see the divinity of each of us unfold as well.

Using 'sliding doors' to various times, Terence Ward gives the reader a glimpse into the extraordinary Caravaggio painting, Seven Acts of Mercy, and its impact on the lives of several. Entwined in the narrative, are details of Naples, revelations on the Papacy, and fascinating concepts of Caravaggio's choice of models. This is a brilliant companion read to complement Pope Francis's declaration of the Year of Mercy. So much packed into this compelling book.
