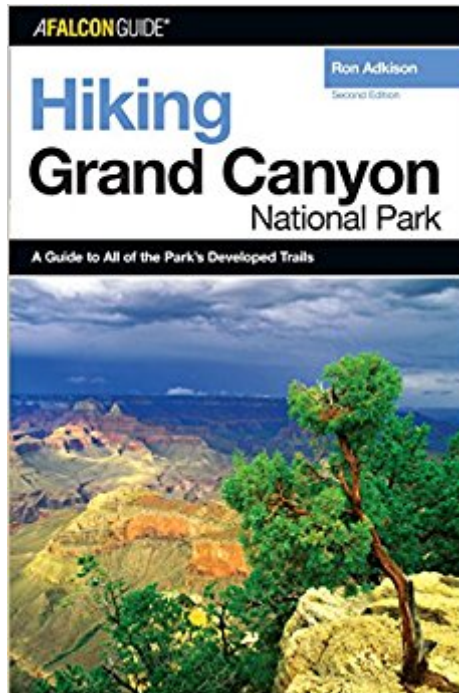

I'm planning a backpacking trip to the Grand Canyon. I've looked at several guidebooks and I've bought bought this book as well as *Hiking Grand Canyon National Park, 2nd (Regional Hiking Series)* by John Annerino, and *Hiking the Grand Canyon's Geology (Hiking Geology)* (HTGCG) by Lon Abbott and Teri Cook. I liked the straightforward and informative approach that Ron Adkinson takes in this book. The Grand Canyon is a big place with a lot of alternatives for trips. I was able figure out which trails I want to take using this book. I especially like the capsule summary of each route that have clear ratings for the difficulty, water availability, average hiking times, suggested cache points, and distance. Compared to this book, I found the HTGCG by Lon Abbott and Teri Cook nearly as good but the focus on the geology in HTGCG makes it harder to pull out the hiking information. Though, once your route is chosen, HTGCG, helps you understand what you see.

I used this book extensively, along with the national park website, to plan a hike into the Grand Canyon in late April of this year, 2014. We hiked down the South Kaibab Trail to the Bright Angel Campground (2 nights) and back out on the Bright Angel Trail with an overnight stop at the Indian Gardens Campground.. The book does a good job of describing the trails and campgrounds. It talks about seasons, weather and tips for making the hike. Using these two resources we had a very successful hike with no surprises. I am now using it to plan a rim to rim hike down the North Kaibab trail and out of the Bright Angel Trail.

I've long thought that Hiking Grand Canyon is one of the best books about backpacking in the park. The PRINT edition is, at any rate. This review is of the Kindle version. This version preserves all of the text, but leaves out the maps that are critical to understanding the text. This is NOT apparent from the sample version of the Kindle edition, which includes the page with the map key, and includes several pictures (in grayscale, but discernible). I've brought my kindle along on some trips because it's lighter than a book, and I'd hoped that this version of the book would be worth having along. It is, but it's not what it really should be.

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
